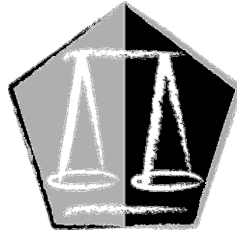

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PRO BONO INITIATIVE PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Pro Bono Initiative is a voluntary program offered by the S.J. Quinney College of Law to emphasize the centrality of public service to the legal profession. The Initiative's goal is to create greater awareness among law students of their ethical responsibility to provide legal services to the disadvantaged and, in turn, to assist in assuring quality legal services to our community. We believe law students who make pro bono work a part of their education will continue commitment to public service into their professional lives. In addition, through the program law students are introduced to a broad variety of substantive law areas and methods of practice.

Participation in the Pro Bono Initiative is not required. However, the College of Law strongly encourages students to perform at least fifty hours of law-related volunteer work, to be completed after their first semester of study and before graduation. The Pro Bono Initiative facilitates this work by providing students a broad spectrum of developed volunteer placements. Volunteer opportunities fall into two categories:

Attorney-supervised placements: A law student assists an attorney or public service agency in the provision of legal services. All work products are to be submitted to a licensed attorney, and an attorney must supervise all client interactions.

Established law-related volunteer placements: These placements are open to lay people from all walks of life. Participating law students will be trained to function as any other volunteer, and should not be represented as having any special expertise in legal matters.

All placements must be related to the law, uncompensated and in the service of public interest.

Student volunteers are required to sign a contract with their placement supervisors and keep a log of volunteer hours.

Supervisors are responsible for overseeing the student's work, signing log sheets and completing an evaluation at the end of the placement. Supervisors should review Rule 5.3 Responsibilities regarding nonlawyer assistants before beginning work with a Pro Bono Initiative volunteer.

ABA MODEL RULE 6.1

voluntary pro bono publico service

A lawyer should aspire to render at least (50) hours of pro bono publico legal services per year. In fulfilling this responsibility, the lawyer should:

- (A) provide a substantial majority of the (50) hours of legal service without fee to:
 - (1) persons of limited means or charitable, religious, civic, community, governmental and educational organizations in matters which are designed primarily to address the needs of persons of limited means, and
- (B) provide any additional services through:
 - (1) delivery of legal services at no fee or a substantially reduced fee to public service or charitable groups or organizations, individuals, groups or organizations seeking to secure or protect civil rights, civil liberties or public rights, or charitable, religious, civic, community, governmental and educational organizations in matters in furtherance of their organizational purposes, where the payment of standard legal fees would significantly deplete the organization's economic resources or would otherwise be inappropriate;
 - (2) delivery of legal services at a substantially reduced fee to persons of limited means; or
 - (3) participation in activities for improving the law, the legal system, or the legal profession.

In addition, a lawyer should voluntarily contribute financial support for organizations that provide legal services to persons of limited means.

2 Get project contact information from the PBI office & get in touch with the supervising attorney.

3 Before starting work, fill out the volunteer consent form in the PBI office & get an hour log sheet to fill out.

4 When you're done just turn in your signed hour log sheet to the PBI office & complete our volunteer survey.

SECOND-YEAR STUDENTS will be required to retake the training as a 3L or as a new attorney to be eligible to participate in the program. The Office of the Guardian ad Litem is initiating this training and placement opportunity because it hopes to create a group of attorneys who, after graduation and passing the bar, will already be credentialed to either volunteer or be compensated as private guardians ad litem.</i>

All cases are a result of domestic violence and previous protective orders, and involve economically disadvantaged clients.</i>

Supervising attorney is readily accessible to review the case and provide support. Cases may take from three weeks to over a year, depending on the nature of the case. Involvement (entry and exit in a case) of a student may occur at any point to accommodate individual circumstances. Students may share or "tag team" on a case if they would like.</i>

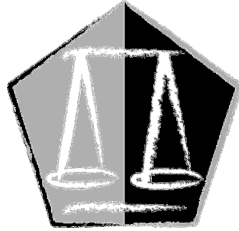
